

IMPERIAL ROME: POLITICAL SHIFTS

ERA / TRANSITION	KEY POLITICAL SHIFT	STRUCTURAL IMPACT
The Principate (27 BC - 284 AD)	<i>Consolidation of Republican offices into a single "First Citizen" (Princeps).</i>	Maintenance of Republican facade while centralizing military and legislative veto power within the Emperor.
The Crisis of the Third Century	<i>Shift toward "Barracks Emperors" and military junta governance.</i>	Erosion of senatorial authority; rapid succession of rulers based on provincial legion loyalty rather than lineage.
The Dominate (284 AD - 476 AD)	<i>Transition from Princeps to Dominus (Lord); adoption of Oriental court rituals.</i>	Complete removal of Republican pretenses; the Emperor becomes an absolute autocrat with divine connotations.
The Tetrarchy (Diocletian Era)	<i>Administrative division of the Empire into four distinct jurisdictions.</i>	Decentralization of executive power to manage borders, leading to the eventual permanent East-West schism.
Constantinian Shift	<i>Integration of Church and State (Edict of Milan).</i>	The Imperial office gains religious legitimacy through Christianity, shifting the cultural base of political power to the East (Byzantium).
